NAPOLEON'S FAREWELL.

Farewell to the Land, where the gloom of my glory Arose and o'ershadowed the earth with her name.

Farewell to thee, France—but when Liberty rallies Once more in thy regions remember me then—

SINGULAR ATTACHMENT FOR WIDOWS.

Leonard Condert, a native of the province of Limosen, in France, was remarkably attached to the fair sex;

To his second wife, he took on the 3d of April following, Mary Boyle, widow, who died on the second of February, 1763.

The third wife whom he married on the 4th of June, was Jane Noailles, widow, who died the 12th of May, 1768.

His attachment to the fair in general, and to widows in particular, suffered no diminution, for on the 6th of February, 1769, he married for the fourth time, with Catherine Vallade, widow, who in her turn left him a solitary mourner the 23d of October, 1771.

He sought for his usual relief; and on the first of July, 1773, he married his fifth wife Ann Bargette, widow, whom heaven was pleased to take to its mercies on the 7th of January, 1777.

He continued to mourn for her loss full four months, when solitude becoming a burthen, he threw off his sable habit, and boldly attacked the lusty widow of Francis Balarbe, who became his sixth wife on the 27th of May, 1777, who blessed him with her endearments no longer than till the 26th of December, 1779.

Habit now became nature, and tho' in the 58th year of his age, he was married for the seventh time on the 3d of July, 1781, to Frances Lapeyre, widow, whom he buried in January, 1784; and immediately attacked the widow of Jean Jacques Zaire, whom he soon after espoused. Here our information respecting this curious man terminates.

AN UGLY WIFE OR A GIBBET. The following amusing anecdote is copied from a MS. sheet of the Border Antiquities of England and Scotland, which is now in progress of publication, and to which Mr. Walter Scott is a contributor:

In the 17th century, the greater part of the property lying upon the river Elicke, belonged to Scott of Harden, who made his principal residence at Oakwood Tower, a border-house of strength still remaining upon that river.

William Scott, (afterwards Sir William) son of the head of this family, undertook an expedition against the Murrays, of Elibank, whose property lay at a few miles distant. He found his enemy upon their guard, was defeated and made prisoner in the act of driving off the cattle, which he had collected for that purpose.

Our hero, Sir Gideon Murray, conducted his prisoner to the castle, where his lady received him with congratulations upon his victory, and inquiries concerning the fate to which he destined the prisoner:—"The Gallows," answered Sir Gideon, for he is said already to have acquired the honor of knighthood, "to the gallows with the marauder."

"Hont na, Sir Gideon," answered the considerate matron in her vernacular idiom, "would you hang the winsome young Laird of Harden when ye have three ill favored daughters to marry?" "Right, right," answered the Baron, who caught at the idea, "he shall ei-

ther marry our daughter, mickled mouth Meg, or strap for it." Upon this alternative being proposed to the prisoner, he upon the first view of the case, stoutly preferred the gibbet to "mickled mouthed Meg," for such was the nick name of the young lady, whose real name was Agnes. But at length when he was literally led forth to execution, and saw no other chance of escape, he retracted his ungallant resolution, and preferred the typical noose of matrimony to the literal cord of hemp.
